Reface with brick and restored 1872/173 at which time a gas works for use by the house was also built. Remodelled internally c.1905. Price of Wales visited Sudbourne Hall 1879 followed by the Duke of Cambridge 1881. Hall stands in park of approximately 500 acres 1891. Church Farmhouse 17th cent. shaped gable ends.

During excavations near the church, beds of ovsters were found c.1912. Headquarters of the St Etheldreda's Liberty 970–19th cent. (an administrative area) was first situated at Sudbourne.
