Roger North: born at Tostock 1653. Appointed to Kings Council 1682, called to Bench of Middle Temple soon after. Solicitor General to Duke of York 1684, Attorney–General to the Queen c.1686 and MP for Dunwich. Author of 'North's Lives' (in 3 volumes) printed 1826. Autobiography of the Hon. Roger North edited by Augustus Jessopp 1887.

Richard Sibbes: believed to have been born Tostock 1579. Master of St. Catherine's Hall, Cambridge 1626 and author of religious works. Brief outline of his life in 'The Lives of Eminent and Remarkable Characters' 1820.

Thomas Chapman: died 1756 aged 111 years, his wife Elizabeth died 1753 aged 93 years. Their gravestones are in the churchyard.
